ATHLETE OF THE YEAR Lani Bloom - Female Small School

Bloom Caps Off Fabulous Running Season

Lani Bloom's fabulous running career at Ithaca came to a close at the Division 3 state finals when she took a pair of first places.

She's the Female Small School Athlete of the Year.

"Lani has been a rock," Ithaca coach Daryl Dawe said. "She has not lost a single solo race this year, which included a national championship in the mile at the Nike Indoor Nationals. She won three regional titles in the 800, 1,600 and 3,200 and her 4x800 team of Rachael Sierakowski, Liliana Lehnst, and Karissa Deacons also took a regional title.

Her work ethic is the key to her success. She simply out practices everyone. I think Lani Bloom has improved mentally this year. She still gets nervous before a race but she handles herself really well."

Dawe will have a lot of memories of Bloom's career.

"I will never forget watching her cross the finish line in a state champ in the 800 and 1,600," Dawe said. "Also getting the cross country monkey off her back was a treasure. I expected Lani to be ready for the state meet. She has a pretty big day and if she performs the way she can good things are going to happen.

"I don't think Lani stops working other than schedule breaks. She will get all of her runs in and work three jobs at times. She is a runner all year with cross country in the fall, indoor in the winter and track in the spring. Lani will be running at Purdue with a full scholarship."

At the state finals, Bloom won the 800 in 2:11.86 and the 1,600 in 4:49.60. Her 4x800 relay team was third in the Nike Outdoor Nationals in 9:47.49 and fourth in the MHSAA Division 3 finals in 9:46.45. She was third at the Nike Outdoor Nationals in 16:59.67.

During the cross country season, Bloom ran 12 races and won 10. She finished second at the other two including at Shepherd where she had a PR of 17:09.3.

Ithaca senior Lani Bloom couldn't have asked for a better final high school state race.

She took the Division 3 state title on Nov. 6 at Michigan International Speedway with a time of 17 minutes 29.69 seconds, which was 30 seconds than the second-place runner.

"It's exactly what I had hoped for," Bloom, who led her team to a ninth-place finish, said. "It went really well for me and went perfectly on my plan. I just followed it and trusted the system, and it worked."

It was 40 degrees at race time compared to 70 degrees a year ago.

"I greatly prefer this year," Bloom said. "I got to wear my arm sleeves, hat, gloves, it was nice. I didn't have to feel hot. I would rather feel cold."

It was a perfect last race as far as Bloom was concerned.

"I'm very excited," she said. "I have never won a cross state title. To finally win it in my last cross race in an Ithaca uniform is awesome."

Confidence was a key, Bloom said.

"Last year, we had some health struggles but we got those sorted out. It was a matter of coming out confident and stronger," she said. "That's what I did and it worked."

A three-sport athlete at Freeland, Huckeby is this year's High School Sports Scene Small School Male Athlete of the Year.

In the fall Huckeby played a big role in Freeland advancing to the Division 4 state semifinals for the second consecutive season. Huckeby played quarterback for Freeland and this past season he threw for 1,703 yards and 17 touchdowns while rushing for 616 yards and 11 rushing touchdowns.

Huckeby turned in a personal-best put of 48-5 when he placed second in the shot put at the Saginaw County Team Championships. A standout in the classroom as well with an almost 4.0 grade-point average, Huckeby will be continuing his athletic and academic career at Anderson College in Indiana where he will play on the school's basketball team next season.

Williamston Athletes Enjoy Productive Year Highlighted By Pair Of State Title Teams

Williamston High School has produced some outstanding teams in a variety of sports over the years, but few years can compare with what was produced by Williamston athletes this year.

The 2021-22 school year was a special one for Williamston athletes, as the school brought home a pair of team championships along with some other noteworthy accomplishments.

The first state championship of the school year came in the month of March when the Williamston boys basketball team won a state championship for the first time in over 70 years. Johnecheck added his name to that
exclusive club as he closed out an
outstanding high school wrestling
career in a big way by winning
his third consecutive state title.

Along with the state titles, Williamston athletes turned in a number of other impressive performances this past season.

Johnecheck, who turned in a 38-2

Pewamo-Westphalia Athletes Make Strong Runs At State Titles In Multiple Sports

Pewamo-Westphalia High School has a long and storied athletic tradition and this past school year added even more hardware to the athletic trophy case.

The 2021-22 school year saw Pewamo-Westphalia not only win another team state championship but Pirate athletes came close to winning state titles in several sports.

The Pewamo-Westphalia football team brought home a state title in November when it defeated Lawton 14-10 in the Division 7 state championship game at Ford Field in Detroit. The win capped a perfect 14-0 season for the Pirates who overcame numerous key injuries throughout the season to complete the perfect record. The Pirates then played in a thrilling state quarterfinal game where they dropped a 60-57 decision to Schoolcraft, the eventual state champion.

The Pewamo-Westphalia girls basketball team also turned in a strong season. Along with posting a winning record the girls won a district championship before falling in the regional semifinals.

Pewamo-Westphalia has a winning tradition in the sport of competitive cheer and this year's squad added to that legacy. The competitive cheer team qualified for the state finals and finished sixth in the state at the Division 4 state finals.

Pirates then defeated Lansing Catholic 12-8 in the Division 3 state quarterfinals before falling to Detroit Edison in the state semifinals at Michigan State University.

The Pirate girls placed second in the girls state finals. The girls team was led by sophomore Saige Martin who was an individual state champion in a pair of events. Martin won state titles in both the 100 and the 300 meter hurdles

The Pewamo-Westphalia boys track team placed fourth overall in Division 4. The boys team produced a state champion as freshman Tryce Tokar won the state title in the pole vault.

The Vikings finished the season 19-15 bringing his career record to 1,228-331, including a state championship in 1986 and four runner up finishes (1994, 2002, 2012 and 2013). He began the season ranked third in coaching wins in Michigan high school softball history.

Now it's time to walk away, even though he will still be involved in the program in some aspect in the coming

"The hard part was telling the junior high kids and the younger kids I have been working with the last four or five years that I wouldn't be there next year," Kennelly said.

"Also the fourth graders I have been working with including my grand kids and a former player of mine Sara Ball (Matuzak) has some really good athletes coming up. Those type of things are hard for me."

Emma Bierlein, a 2018 graduate of Swan Valley was one of those players that were taken under TKs wing at an

Bierlein actually did her Senior Project on The Benefit of Youth Sports with Kennelly as her mentor on the

"I was one of those players that he started working with from a young age," Bierlein said.

"I started playing softball in fifth grade.TK teaches his young players the basic skills early on so that as they progress, they can continue to build off that firm foundation. I love how TK is old-school. You don't see a lot of people coach the way he does anymore. We ran when we played bad, there were repercussions if you talked back, you sat the next game if you missed practice, etc. There were no participation trophies with TK, you had to earn your spot, but he would work with you to help you get there."

Kennelly played football under veteran Hemlock coach Bob Wallace and later returned to his alma mater after graduating from

Central Michigan in 1971. He started his tenure at Swan Valley in 1972, coaching football until 1989 and girls basketball from 1989 through 2007 compiling a 321-122 record.

But the softball diamond was his passion and working with pitchers made him a household name around the area. Kennelly has sent numerous pitchers onto the next level...six went on to Division 1, six Division 2 and a bunch more to Division 3

Addy said Kennelly was a

His achievements are endless.

TK was inducted into the Michigan High School Coaches Hall of Fame in 1998. In 2012, he was named the Michigan High School Coaches Association Coach of the Year and the National Federation of State High School Coaches Association Coach of

He was inducted in the Saginaw County Sports Hall of Fame in 2014.

Kennelly still expects to work n Valley pitchers in the off season.

"There are big shoes to fill as his legacy is left unmatched," Addy said

Former Saginaw High principal Don Durrett called Ueberroth a miracle worker on the sidelines during the Trojans championship football run in 1999.

"Rob was one of the positive and motivating people I've ever met," Durrett said. "There wasn't many times during his tenure with us that he couldn't get a player ready to play on a Friday night. He always would go that extra mile for

It wasn't anything new for Ueberroth to come in Saturday morning during film study with pizza in one hand and suggestions and opinions of what he saw from the game

appreciative for everything Ueberroth brought to the table.

"Rob was one of the good ones," Durrett said. "He's going to be missed by so many.

Ueberroth graduated from Bay City Central High School in 1990.

In 1999, he earned a bachelor's degree in education and sports training from Saginaw Valley State University. There, he spent three summers as a student trainer for the Detroit Lions, the NFL team that hosted its training camps at the Kochville Township-based

In honor of his passing the schools faculty have elected to either dye their hair or streak their hair purple with Ueberroth looking down with all the community support that loved this man

"Rob was loved by so many," Carpenter said. "We are all going to miss him greatly."

Ueberroth married Heather Eldredge in June 2003 at Our Lady of Czestochowa-St. Stanislaus Church. She works as a teacher for Saginaw Public Schools.

Besides their sons, Tyler and Cody Ueberroth is survived by his parents, Bill and Pat Ueberroth; and two brothers, Jeff and Mike Ueberroth


