


All were hard workers. Kaleb Peska and Charlie Martyn started every game. Charlie is now playing baseball at Alma College."



Some high school sports fans believe speed is the only success in the sport of softball.

Ada Bradford of Leslie is proving that wrong.

The LHS senior went over the 1.000 mark in career strikeouts on the mound for the Blackhawks earlier in April.

So, what is her secret for being the queen of K's?

"Most pitchers believe speed is the main key to becoming a successful pitcher," Bradford said. My pitching instructor has taught me to use movement and spin.
