Senior Class Helping Williamston Football Team To Strong Start This Season

Thanks to an outstanding group of seniors, the Williamston football team is off to a blazing start this

With the seniors helping to lead the way, Williamston opened the season with five straight wins. Williamston is also third in the state in Division 4 in playoff points

"We are off to an outstanding start due to our senior leadership and senior experience," said Williamston coach Steve Kersten. "Many of our seniors have started for the past couple of years. We had a rough season a year ago and our seniors have demanded a new attitude and a new focus. Strong accountability has been seen from our quarterback Kaleb Nielson and our all-state linebacker Miles

Nielson is one of the leaders of a potent Williamston offense that is putting up 37.6 points a game.

Through the first four games of the season Nielson passed for 652 yards and 10 touchdowns.

"Kaleb is playing at a high level," Kersten said. "He is very intelligent and is spending many hours in film study which is showing up on Friday nights in offensive efficiency."

Nielson has plenty of targets to throw to. Tommy Pratt, a 6-foot-5 senior who was also a member of Williamston's school-record 4x100 relay team in the spring track season, caught eight passes for 362 yards and five touchdowns through the first four games. Eston Thorburn has seven catches for 151 yards and a pair of scores while Hunter VanSickler has 10 receptions for 148 yards and a pair of touchdowns.

The Hornet ground game is led by running back Joe Smith who has added 309 yards and five

"Ioe is running at a high level," Kersten said. "He is getting tough

vards inside and is also using his speed on the edge."

Paving the way for the backs and ends is a deep and skilled offensive

"We have a seven-man rotation on the offensive line and their consistency has been critical in our offensive success," Kersten said. "Juniors Shad Fritts and Jude Ide have anchored our offensive line. Anthony Heinritz is a threeyear starter and he is playing very physical football. Evan Delp, Hank Palazzolo, Carter Dalyrimple and Gage Chambers are all also having a great start to the year."

While the offense has been productive, the Hornet defense has been extremely stingy this season. Williamston is allowing just 8.6 points per game through the first five games of the season and posted consecutive shutouts against Mason, Fowlerville and St. Johns "Our defense has been stout

New Lothrop after its first three games, got off to a 2-1 start.



While MLS is 2-3 overall, the three losses have come against Ithaca, Saginaw Nouvel and Saginaw Valley Lutheran, three teams who have a combined record of 14-1 through the first five weeks of the season. MLS is averaging 31.4 points per game this season and is primed to string together some wins during the second half of the slate.

Saginaw Nouvel has started the season strong with wins in four of its first five games. The Panthers kicked off the season with a 14-0 win against Sandusky and then turned back Detroit Loyola 41-6. Nouvel's lone loss came against Valley Lutheran. The Panthers are averaging 33.2 points per game and have a big test remaining in week seven when they host Ithaca. Nouvel is paced on offense by quarterback Ian Ziegelmann who has passed for 590 yards and six touchdowns. Owen Vance leads the ground game with 471 yards and nine touchdowns.

St. Louis has opened the season with a 2-3 record while facing a rugged schedule. The Sharks fell against Ithaca and Saginaw Valley Lutheran who have combined to go 10-0 so far this season. St. Louis got on track

8-Player Division 1

Blanchard-Montabella is among the leaders in the Central Michigan 8-Man Blue with a 3-0 conference record. Overall, the Mustangs have a 5-0 record and have been as impressive as any 8-man football team in the state. The Mustangs have scored 52 or more points in all five wins and are averaging a whopping 57.2 points per game. Montabella is also playing stingy defense as it is allowing 11.6 points per game. The regular season ends with a pair of big hurdles with league co-leader Merrill in week eight and 8-man, Division 2 powerhouse Portland St. Patrick in week nine.

Merrill is keeping pace with Blanchard-Montabella at the top of the Centrl Michigan 8-Man Blue Division with a 3-0 league record. Overall, the Vandals have a 4-1 record and are in the top ten in the state in playoff points in Division 1. Merrill features a potent offense that is putting up 34.8 points per game. After dropping its opener to Portland St. Patrick, the Vandals have reeled off four straight wins. The end of the regular season will present some major challenges with Montabella in week eight and Fulton in week nine.

Fulton-Middleton started the season strong

with a 3-2 record. The Pirates have been scoring points in bunches as the offense is averaging 37.6 points per game. The Pirates have lost to two of the premier Division 2 teams in the state in Portland St. Patrick and Morrice and still has a big league battle with Merrill on the schedule.

Breckenridge opened the season with wins in three of its first five games. The Huskies are putting up 22.8 points per game. Breckenridge came up short against league leaders Montabella and Merrill but are looking to close the season strong and nab a playoff berth

Bay City All-Saints is on track for a playoff berth with wins in three of its first five games. The Cougars have been solid on offense averaging 28 points per game while the defense has proven to be strong and is allowing 11.4 points per game.

8-Player Division 2

Portland St. Patrick is turning in another huge season in Division 2. The Shamrocks have a perfect 5-0 and lead all Division 2 teams in the state in playoff points. A high-scoring offense has been a key for the Shamrocks wo are averaging 48.4 points per game. St. Patrick also boasts a strong defense that is allowing just 9.4 points per game. St. Patrick has a big 14-7 win against Morrice to its credit and faced Division 1 powerhouse Blanchard-Montabella in week nine.

Morrice is ranked in the top ten in the state in Division 2 in playoff points and has a 4-1 record. The Orioles are putting up 39 points per game on offense while the defense is allowing 13.6 points per game. The Orioles fell short against league rival Portland St. Patrick in a defensive struggle but rebounded with a big win against Fulton. Morrice reached the Division 2 state championship game last season and the team has the talent to make a return trip this season.






